5. CALL TO ORDER – REGULAR SESSION

Mr. Ortega called the meeting to order at 7:02 p.m.

6. PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

Mr. Ortega invited the audience to join together in reciting the Pledge of Allegiance.

7. REPORT OF CLOSED SESSION DECISIONS

Item 9.A. Superintendent's Report

Mr. Christensen announced that the California Department of Education announced that Serrano Elementary, Imperial Elementary, Nohl Canyon Elementary and Chapman Hills Elementary Schools have received recognition as California Distinguished Schools. He congratulated staff, parents and students at these schools.

Mr. Christensen also stated that Sycamore Elementary School has been elected to receive the Title I Academic Achievement Award from the Department of Education. This award is presented to schools with predominately socio-economically disadvantaged students who make significant advances in academic achievement.

On behalf of the Board of Education, Mr. Ortega presented a Certificate of Recognition to Ms. Maroney and expressed appreciation for her dedication to the students, staff, and parents at Canyon Hills School.

Item 9.D. State of the School Report

Shale Snyder, student representative for Orange High School, presented her state of the school report using the theme, "Orange High School is the best kept secret in Orange County." Highlighted in the video was the Marine Corps JROTC Program, the only such program in Orange County and the Future Farmers of America Program, who has been named a California Outstanding Agriculture Department. Both programs are unique to Orange County schools.

Item 12.A. Board President Request to Extend the Ground Lease Agreement between Peralta Golf Partnership and the District for the Peralta Site

This item was pulled from the agenda and was neither acted upon nor discussed. See Motion No. 92 above.

The District entered into a ground lease agreement ("Lease") with the Peralta Golf Partnership beginning September 14, 1994. Peralta Golf Partnership has been using the site for recreational and support services to the neighborhood since the inception of the Lease. Peralta Golf Partnership maintains the facilities and pays for all costs, including utilities. The lease is set to expire on March 31, 2015. Board President Ortega requested that the Board members discuss amending the Lease to extend the term of Lease for one year to March 31, 2016. All other terms and conditions of the Lease are unmodified. The additional year of revenue will be approximately \$200,000.

Item 12.B. Public Hearing: California School Employees Association Chapter #76 Proposal The California School Employees Association, Chapter #67, (CSEA) presented the attached proposal for 2014-15 reopener negotiations. The Board held a Public Hearing to receive input on the proposal from CSEA.

Item 12.D. Public Hearing: Proposed 2014-17 Local Control and Accountability Plan

Dr. Hansen provided information on the Local Control and Accountability Plan. Implementation of the Local Control Funding Formula (LCFF) and the Local Control and Accountability Plan (LCAP) regulations require that each district's LCAP public hearing be held in advance and at a separate meeting prior to the LCAP adoption. The intent of the LCAP hearing is to allow for public comment and recommendations regarding the specific actions and expenditures proposed to be included in the LCAP and budget (Education Code 52062(b)). Further, the regulations require that the public hearing for budget be held at the same meeting as the public hearing for the LCAP

While the State, through the State Board of Education, has not yet finalized the regulations and accountability rubrics, there are eight areas of State priority that must be addressed in the District's LCAP:

Conditions for Learning

- Basic Services: provide all students' access to fully credentialed teachers, instructional materials that align with state standards, and safe facilities
- Implementation of Common Core State Standards: implement the Common Core State Standards in English and English Language Development, Mathematics and the Next Generation Science Standards
- **Course Access:** ensure all students have access to a broad course of study to prepare them for college and careers

Pupil Outcomes

- **Student Achievement**: improved student learning for all students and subgroups measured by local assessments, state assessments, English proficiency rates, and college and career readiness indicators
- Other Student Outcomes: measuring other important student outcomes such as Career Technical Education (CTE) pathway completion, A-G Course completion, and locally identified success measures

Engagement

- Parental Involvement: meaningful participation by parents that include decision making and program development
- **Student Engagement:** supporting student's connectedness and engagement in school including improved attendance and graduation rates
- **School Climate**: provide a welcoming, healthy school culture for all students as measured by healthy kids' surveys and district discipline data

The development and adoption of the LCAP will become the new State-mandated strategic planning process for districts across the State of California. Actions and services identified in the eight state priorities are directly aligned to LCFF funding.

The Board of Education received information items on the LCAP Development Process and the LCFF Spending Plan for the current school year. Additionally, the Board received an information item regarding the LCAP update on actions, services and expenditures, as well as the District's summary of stakeholder engagement on April 17th.

The LCAP has been shared with the Superintendent's District Advisory Council (DAC), District English Learner Advisory Committee (DELAC), and various stakeholder committees. An intensive community engagement process beginning in September 2013 resulted in continuous refinement of the LCAP actions and services. In addition, the LCAP was formed by surveys, stakeholder meetings, and consultation with the employee associations.

A public hearing was held to receive public comment on the 2014- 2017 LCAP.

Item 12.E. Public Hearing: 2013-14 Estimated Actuals and 20141-15 All Funds Budget Education Code section 52062(b)(2) includes a new requirement effective with the 2014-15 budget year. Previously, the public hearing and adoption of the proposed budget occurred during the same board meeting in June. With the new regulation, the public meeting at which a school district governing board adopts a budget, must be held after, but not on the same day as, the public meeting at which the governing board holds the required public hearing. The adoption of the proposed budget is scheduled for the June 5, 2014 board meeting.

The total budgeted attendance of 26,345.03 (not including District charter schools, county special education, county community schools and SB1446 declining enrollment protection) reflects an

anticipated decline of 164.05 in District ADA. District charter schools' ADA of 2,124.04 reflects a slight growth of 2.2 as compared to the prior year.

Revenues: Although the State of California has not adopted its 2014-15 Budget at this time, the Governor's January proposal continues implementation of the Local Control Funding Formula (LCFF). The California Department of Education and Department of Finance continue to refine the LCFF calculation to reflect the language as passed through legislation. While the state transitions to the LCFF, it is likely there will be additional changes in policy and in the application of the law which will impact the LCFF calculation.

The following chart shows the driving factors of the LCFF in addition to ADA:

Until the state adopts its 2014-15 Budget, the proposed funded LCFF yields an estimated \$17,281,221 increase as compared to the prior year primarily due to the increase in Transitional Gap Funding.

Most state categorical entitlements and grants known to be ongoing are projected at current levels. Only special education AB602 funding is expected to receive the 0.86 % COLA in 2014-15. No increase is anticipated for ongoing federal programs in this adoption as the Federal Government continues to work toward a solution for the federal deficit and debates its budget for an October 1 fiscal year adoption. Interest earnings are projected at .29% and lottery is estimated at \$156 per student (\$126 unrestricted, \$30 restricted by Proposition 20).

Staffing: Certificated staffing is based upon a ratio of 30:1 for grades TK-6; 32:1 for grades 7-12. Salaries include step/column increases for certificated employees and step/range increases for classified employees. Statutory benefits (STRS, PERS, Workers' Compensation, etc.) are driven by payroll costs. Health benefits are based on 2014-15 allocations.

Expenditures: Supplies, services/operating expenses, and capital outlay are in conformity with estimated site and program budgets.

The estimated unexpended entitlements have been included in components of the 2013-14 ending fund balance and added to the 2014-15 budget expenditure lines. The estimated unexpended entitlements include: Medi-Cal Billing Option, Special Education Mental Health Services, Common Core State Standards and ROP Adult Fee based programs of approximately \$ 6.2 million.

Other unexpended/remaining components of the 2013-14 ending fund balance are non-resident tuition, site/department donations, LCFF Supplemental/Concentration Funds, Instructional Materials, Credential Support Contracts, MediCal Administration Activities, Adult Education CALWORKS and AP Fee Reimbursement of approximately \$ 3.8 million; these estimated

unexpended items have been included in the 2014-15 Budget expenditure lines.

Ending Balance: The projected ending balance of \$67,553,124 is comprised of the following:

The ending balance meets the State-required three-percent reserve, and the 2014-15 Budget complies with the AB1200 accountability guidelines as set forth by the State of California.

The adoption of the proposed budget is scheduled for the June 5, 2014 Board meeting. Unaudited actuals for 2013-14 and budget revisions for 2014-15 which result from carryover and the actual adoption of the State of California budget will be presented to the Board of Education at its September 11, 2014 meeting.

The First Interim Report will occur on December 11, 2014, with the Second Interim to be presented in March 2015.

13. INFORMATION/DISCUSSION ITEMS

Item 13.A. General Obligation Bond Overview – Bond Measure Feasibility Study Result At the March 14 and June 6, 2013 meetings, the Board of Education received information with respect to General Obligation (GO) Bonds and the impact of proposed legislation on long-term facilities financing to the District. Additionally, at the October 24, 2013 meeting, the Board received information on the steps necessary to ensure a successful bond measure from TBWB Strategies.

On March 13, 2014 the Board of Education approved True North Research, Inc. to conduct a statistically reliable survey of voters in the District to assess the feasibility of placing a bond measure on the November 2014 ballot. The primary objectives of the survey were to determine if a bond measure is feasible and identify how to structure a measure so that it is consistent with the community's priorities. The scope of work included a demographic analysis, public opinion survey

of local voters, questionnaire and voter sampling strategy, and final assessment of the feasibility of the bond measure.

True North conducted the telephone survey between March 28 and April 1, 2014 to a random sample of 400 registered voters in the District who are likely to participate in the November 2014 election. The survey has a statistical margin of error due to sampling of +/- 4.9% at the 95% level of confidence. The Board of Education was presented with the methodology and the results of the survey.

Item 13.B. General Obligation Bond Overview – Draft Resolution of the Board of Education Ordering an Election and Establishing Specifications of the Election Order

Speaker

Jim Dinwiddie spoke about some of his observations regarding the draft resolution by asking rhetorical questions for which he did not expect a reply.

Introduction

At the March 14 and June 6, 2013 meetings, the Board of Education received information with respect to General Obligation (GO) bonds and the impact of proposed legislation on long-term facilities financing to the District. Additionally, at the October 24, 2013 meeting, the Board of Education received information on the steps necessary to ensure a successful bond measure from TBWB Strategies.

At the April 17, 2014 meeting, Mr. David Casnocha, Senior Shareholder from Stradling Yocca Carlson & Rauth (SYCR), discussed the legal issues relating to the issuance of GO bonds. At this meeting, the Board received a preview of the election resolution that will be submitted for consideration at the June 5th meeting. Mr. Casnocha stated that the document in progress. It will be further polished with input provided from staff and the Board for approval at a later date. The resolution will be modified based on input and feedback received.

Following his presentation, Mr. Casnocha responded to and clarified Board members' questions.

Discussion

Mr. Christensen stated that the Board needed to have a discussion about the bond rate stating that the next time this item comes back to the Board, the Board will be taking action on it. Mr. Ortega asked Mr. Casnocha and Mr. Heath to speak to what would be the best rate to move forward with. Based on the survey results, Mr. Heath stated that the \$296 million figure in the draft resolution corresponds to the \$39 per \$100,000 tax rate that was tested in the survey. It is their opinion that that is the highest amount that should be considered. There is evidence of risk tolerance at that level; the safer bet would \$34 per \$100,000 tax rate for a \$260 million bond measure. However, at any tax rate, a good campaign must be run.

With the understanding that the resolution would have to state the tax rate, Mr. Ortega asked for Board consensus. The Board members responded individually with the tax rate they favored:

This easy-to-use, low-cost program eliminates the need to maintain paper copies of MSDS on-site and includes the dissemination of Hazmat related information including Material Safety Data Sheets and Chemical Spill and Poison Control information services to all District sites. Authorization is requested to continue those services with CSBA for the period of July 1, 2014 – June 30, 2015.

Item 14.L. Study Trips

The following study trip was approved by the Board of Education:

El Modena High School - Speech and Debate - Overland Park, Kansas - June 14-21, 2014

El Modena High's Speech and Debate Team, under the supervision of Molly Chertock, will travel to Overland Park to participate in the National Forensic League Tournament of Champions. The students will be competing at the highest level in speech and debate, learning communication skills that will become lifelong skills. They will compete with students from around the nation. The students qualified for the tournament by participating in over 150 hours of previous competition. This trip meets both state and common core goals of English and communications. The two female and one male student will be accompanied by two female and one male adult chaperones. Chaperones and students will stay at the Ramada Inn. Transportation will be provided by United

Airlines departing from John Wayne Airport. The total cost per student is \$1,000 and no student is prevented from making the field trip due to lack of sufficient funds per Education Code 35330(b), 35331. The students will not miss any school days. A substitute is not required.

Item 14.M. Out of State Conference Request

The Board approved the out of state conferences as follows:

College Board's AP Reading-Cincinnati, OH -June 1-9, 2014

Gregory Mitchell, Villa Park High School AP Science Teacher, has been invited by the College Board to serve as an AP Reader at this year's annual AP Reading. College faculty and AP teachers from around the world will gather to evaluate and score about 18 million free-response answers. Participants will receive training in consistent application of the scoring standards, interact with members of the AP Development Committee responsible for revising the AP course descriptions and developing the exam, and discuss achievement, assessment and teaching strategies with college faculty and AP teachers. They will return to the classroom with absolute clarity for students, parents, and colleagues on what students need to be successful on their exams. Participants will also have the opportunity to earn continuing education units. There is no fiscal impact to the District.

Item 14.0. Acceptance of Funds from the Children Families Commission of Orange County – Agreement No. FCI-SD-19 – Amendment – for 2012-14 Fiscal Years

The Board accepted this funding \$1,483,791.59 and authorized the Superintendent or designee to enter into an appropriate agreement.

Item 14.P. Memorandum of Understanding: OUSD and the Orange County Health Care Agency

The Board authorized the Superintendent or designee to enter into a Memorandum of Understanding with the Orange County Health Care Agency in order to maintain access to mental health services for special education students.

Item 14.Q. Memorandum of Understanding: Santa Ana Unified School District and the District

The Board authorized the District to enter into the Memorandum of Understanding with Santa Ana Unified School District through 2015. Santa Ana Unified School District will provide on-going educational services to individual deaf and hard of hearing pupils who reside in the Orange Unified School District. Currently, this comprehensive, self-contained program is not available within the District.

Item 14.R. Memorandum of Understanding between the District and Equal Opportunity Schools, 2014-15

The Board approved the application to enter into the Memorandum of Understanding between the District and the Equal Opportunity Schools project by allocating matching funds. Orange Unified School District was recently selected to participate in the AP/IB (Advanced Placement/International Baccalaureate) Equity and Excellence Project with the Equal Opportunity Schools (EOS), supported by the Google Global Impact Awards and Harvard Ed Labs. OUSD was among a select group of schools selected based on our commitment to the success of historically underrepresented students in Advance Placement and International Baccalaureate programs.

Item 14.S. Memorandum of Understanding between the District and Adrylan Communications, Inc.

The Board approved the application to enter into the Memorandum of Understanding between the District and Adrylan Communications, Inc. (EADMS) to participate in a short-term pilot agreement demonstrating the EADMS Assessment Technology Platform. This short-term pilot will give OUSD the opportunity to evaluate the EADMS system for possible widespread use within the District. This platform utilizes meaningful, district-supplied data, as a comprehensive professional development program being implemented to foster better collaboration and instruction by teachers.

Item 14.T. Memorandum of Understanding between the District and Microsoft Corporation, 2014-15

The Board approved the application to enter into the Memorandum of Understanding between the District and Microsoft Corporation. Canyon High School will conduct a pilot program using Microsoft SharePoint to create a collaborative instructional environment where students can create documents, assignments and projects in a cloud based system. Microsoft will provide funding for the pilot that includes 40 Asus T100 personal use devices and technical support provided by a Microsoft certified partner.

Item 14.U. Agreement between Children's Hospital of Orange County (CHOC) and the District for Hospital Instruction

The Board approved the agreement with Children's Hospital of Orange County to provide services through June 30, 2019. The District is required to provide special education programs to hospitalized students. CHOC provides quality education for students during their hospital stay and the District will provide special education programs for school age persons with exceptional needs.

KEYGENT ADVISORS

Item 14.H. Use, Sale, or Distribution of Fireworks or Pyrotechnic Devices for Special Occasions

The District's Memorandum of Coverage is subject to change each year as a member of the Southern California Regional Liability Excess Fund (SCR). SCR is an organization comprised of Southern California K-12 school agencies to address property, liability and risk management requirements. One of the changes in the coverage this year is the inclusion of the use, sale, or distribution of fireworks or pyrotechnic devices with the following conditions:

- The event must be approved by the Board of Education
- The event must be recognized as a special occasion
- The District must take prudent risk management precautions

Speaker

Nicole Jones, PFSO President at Cerro Villa Middle School, stated that she applied for a permit with the City of Villa Park to sell safe and sane fireworks in the City of Villa Park this year. She asked for consideration to sell safe and sane fireworks at Villa Park High School because there are very few place to sell fireworks in Villa Park. Selling fireworks would allow Cerro Villa to raise money for the upcoming school year. Last year, Cerro Villa raised over \$80,000, the proceeds of which went to technology at the school.

Mrs. Moffat stated she appreciates the efforts of Cerro Villa Middle School and Villa Park High School; however, it bother her that schools are involved with the sale of fireworks because of the dangers associated with them and the injuries that can result. She stated that she will oppose this item.

Mrs. Singer stated that she is opposed to the sale of fireworks because of the danger they pose, but because this item is for Crescent Elementary and the fireworks will be going off high in the sky, she will support the item.

Motion No. 97

It was moved by Mr. Ortega, seconded by Mr. Surridge and carried by a vote of 6-1 (No: Moffat) to approve the use, sale or distribution of fireworks with the appropriate city authorization, use of facility applications, and insurance certificates at Crescent Elementary, Villa Park High School, and

Kelly Stadium. The District's Memorandum of Coverage is subject to change each year as a member of the Southern California Regional Liability Excess Fund.

Item 14.J. Receipt of Charter School Petition

The Board received the charter school petition from the Nopilhuán K-8 Charter School. Pursuant to the Education Code, a public hearing will be held during the month of June to consider the level of support for the petition by teachers employed by the District, other employees of the District, and parents. Following the public hearing and review of the petition, the petition will be placed on a future Board agenda for action.

Discussion

Mr. Ledesma asked for an explanation of the petition and what are the next steps for the Board. Mr. Kissee clarified that when the District receives a charter petition, it is brought to the Board for them to receive it. Voting for this item will simply acknowledge receipt of the petition. From this point, staff will schedule a public hearing to be conducted at the next Board meeting which will provide an opportunity for the Board to consider the level of support for this petition by District employees and parents. Once that is concluded, staff will engage in a study of this proposal and will provide a review to the Board. The Board will either approve or deny the petition at second future meeting.
